Have your personal information filled out on your paysheet




Day of your match

The First Impression is a Lasting One!





Arrival at the Court

- Walk in proudly and with a smile
- Place your official's bag behind the table as room allows
- Greet everyone at the table and introduce yourself
- Take out all the equipment you need to complete pre-match check (ball gauge, net chain, whistle, cards, etc.)




Time to get to work

- Check the net height-use chain
- Antennas should line up the outside edge of the sideline (use your chain to line up antenna)
- Ball should rebound naturally out of the net
- Net supports are padded up to 5 ½ and tension devices are covered
- Check the ball pressure-4.3-4.6 psi





Check the Net, Standards and Referee Stand

Time to get to work

- Check out the court markings
- 2" wide centerline-solid or shadow-bordered
- Referee stand is sturdy and padded up to 5' ½"
- Verify location of team benches and official's table
- Identify non-playable areas include the ceiling



The Court

Dimensions: 60' x 30'


- Sub zone: 10' from center line to attack line
- Libero Replacement zone: between the attack line and end line
- Service area: minimum of 6' beyond end line
- Bench: positioned parallel with the attack line

Pre-Match Conference

- Officials, captains, and head coaches
- Collect team rosters
- Cover ground rules (i.e., non-playable areas, boundaries, overhead obstructions, change in surface, etc. as needed)
- Identify "speaking" captains who will call the toss
- Toss the coin, catch it, and present it without turning it over
- The winner of the toss decides to 'serve' or 'receive'
- Report the results of the coin toss to the scorer



Pre-Match Duties

 Check that all table personnel – scorer, timer, assistant scorer (tracker) are available

 Brief crew with R2 as needed— scorer, timer, assistant scorer

Warm-up Protocol

Know what the protocol will be-

- Warm-up time is determined by the school, not the officials
- Will there be Introductions?
- Will the National Anthem be played?
- Is it Parent's Night?



As the Teams Warm-up

- R1 meets with the line judges, gives them instruction and gives them assignment
- R2 meets with the table crew to ensure competence and preferences (i.e., does the R2 need to call out sub #s?)
- Maintain pleasant attitude, but avoid fraternization



Review Line Judge Responsibilities



As the Teams Warm-up

- Meet with your co-official to make sure you are both on the same page
- Review eye contact at end of play, what to do if R1 waves you off, touch calls, R2-side antenna violations, and back-row play information
- Review handling coaching issues, bench control, subs and time out procedures, issuing cards, collecting lineup sheets, lineup card preparation, and crowd control




Introductions and National Anthem

If introductions and National Anthem are used, plan ahead

- The R1, R2 and line judges should walk across the court opposite the official's table and line-up near the referee stand R1 and LJ on the left side of the net, and the R2 and LJ on the right
- After National Anthem and player introductions (and sometimes announcements), the R1 steps forward, whistles and signals for players to approach the net to shake hands.
- Officials then take their positions to begin the match

Pre-Match Complete

- Some wonder why should you arrive at a volleyball match 30 minutes early?
- If you take care of the details, as protocol, it will take about 30 minutes to complete
- Why take a chance on leaving something undone?
- We have been at matches where it was the first time for a scorer to keep score, where the first ball hits an overhead beam near the fan's bleachers (so, was it in or out), where there were no attack lines, at a middle school match where the brand-new coach does not know how to fill out a lineup, and so on—get there early
